A LETTER FROM WCADC'S NEW PRESIDENT: BARBARA JOANN COMBS

Let me introduce myself, my name is Barbara Joann Combs. I am an artist, art educator, community arts collaborator born in Los Angeles, California. I've worked within the discipline of visual arts since childhood. After receiving a B.A. with distinction in visual arts from Fayetteville State University, I wrote and taught curriculum for art fundamentals courses at Seventy-First High School, North Carolina for seven years. My desire to learn more about community arts brought me to Maryland and I earned a MA and MFA in Community Arts from Maryland Institute College of Art.

Working within five Baltimore communities facilitating four quilt projects and two summer youth programs creating murals was pure joy! A community mural was created in collaboration with the Johnson Square neighborhood at Ambrose Kennedy Park and pool. Prince George's County has been my home for eight years. During the pandemic a virtual community workshop was developed with Greenbelt Recreation Arts for African American History Month and this relationship continues with in-person workshops.

Recent group exhibits include Shifting Paradigms, Prince George's Community College Gallery; Hope & Healing, Montpelier Art Center; and Hand Made, Black Rock Gallery. WCADC exhibits include What Is Ours, Sandy Spring Museum; Songs That Make Us Move, The Friendship Gallery, and Occupy the Moment: Embracing Our History, Enhancing Our Impact, Bridgeport Art Center, Chicago, IL. Within the Greenbelt community at the City Council Chambers, Greenbelt News Review, and New Deal Cafe. Past exhibits include Lowe House, Montpelier Arts Center, Serendipity Labs, Gallery Miriam, and Pyramid Atlantic.

Currently, I teach art for Prince George's County Public Schools at Gaywood Elementary, to students in PreK through 5th grade. I partner with University of Maryland and Towson University to mentor art education majors seeking to become art teachers. Gaywood's



principal gives me free reign to paint murals on the walls and doors of the school and I enlist students and teachers to help. In addition, high schools partner with me to facilitate mural painting within Gaywood to fulfill students' Service Learning hours.

My focus this year as President of WCADC will be to rally our members to strengthen our existing committees: Community Outreach, Programs, Exhibitions, Communications, and Membership. We can make this chapter stronger when we work together. Will you work with me?

From the Studio of Ghia Haddad

Women in history have found themselves at the losing end of a misogynistic narrative. Women of color more so, as they have had the misfortune to be seen through the patriarchal lens of history as well as an orientalist one; where their story, and with it, their lasting representation was fabricated to satisfy economic and political ends. My focus when I produce art is a world reimagined, free from the shackles of perceived exoticism, mystification, violence and eroticism usually reserved for Western representations of Eastern women within what Edward Said calls "the corporate institution for dealing with the Orient."

I feel that it is a crucial time to concentrate our endeavors, as women of color, to help decolonize our own image of ourselves with the deliberate usage of mediums that would be considered "primitive" or "exotic."

While fiber arts have existed forever, they were dismissed from the sphere of high art for being too feminine and banned by The Royal Academy. This resulted in the omission of women's expression from the history of Western art. Art from the global South, on the other hand, was relegated to an academically inferior platform particularly for its use of "crafty" materials such as textiles.

Through experiments with fabric, strings, and yarn, let us aim to merge East and West, old and new, feminine and masculine, to challenge the traditional Western understanding of high art and ask questions about the role of women of color within that understanding
